Principal investigator

principal investigator (PI) *n* - **[research]** 1. The person having responsibility for conduct of the research proposed in a grant application submitted to the National Institutes of Health; such a person in any **funding application** submitted to the NIH, whether for **grant** or **contract** funding; such a person named on any funding proposal, regardless of funding source. 2. The person in charge of a research project; the lead scientist on a research project. 3. The head of a center in a multicenter study. 4. The chair of a multicenter study. 5. The head of a clinical center in a multicenter trial rt: co-principal investigator Usage note: The term serves both as an administrative (defn 1) and leadership label (defn 2). It is a mistake to assume that an administrative role translates automatically into to a leadership role, though often the person named in the sense of defn 1 is the same person named or implied in the sense of defn 2 in the case of most investigator-initiated single-center research projects. Avoid use of the term, or its abbreviation, PI, as a leadership label in any single-center setting where more than one person is being referenced. Avoid in the sense of defn 2 in settings having multiple "principal investigators"; use center director and chair of study to designate positions of leadership in multicenter settings. Avoid uses in the sense of defn 5 since those uses carry subtle connotations that those heading resource centers are not as "principal" to the overall effort as their clinical counterparts.
